

Secondary Field in Regional Studies: Russia, Eastern Europe, & Central Asia Eligible Courses Offered in 2008-2009

The secondary field requires a total of FIVE half-courses distributed across at least two different disciplines. At least THREE courses must be in the social sciences; at least THREE courses must be taught by REECA faculty; and at least THREE courses must be regular departmental courses.
